PROMOTING PATHWAYS FOR WALKING AND CYCLING IN NORFOLK

- A community coalition that advocates for the development and improvement of connected pathways in Norfolk County.
- We also promote the regular use of trails, sidewalks and roadways for health, recreation and active transportation.

Active Transportation [AT]

AT refers to people-powered transport such as walking, cycling, using a wheelchair, in-line skating or skateboarding.

Why walking?

 From a transportation perspective, walking is recognized as the only mode of travel that is universally affordable, and allows children and youth, older adults and people using mobility aids, to travel independently.

But we need walkable communities to do so.



Walkable Communities have...

 street lighting, availability of continuous sidewalks, and a variety of shops, services, parks, schools, and workplaces within walking distance of homes.

 safe, direct, comfortable, and convenient walking routes for all pedestrians.





Walkable communities...

 Are an important aspect of a healthy and vibrant community.

 Encourage citizens to rely on their cars less and choose walking more often, when the environment in which they live, work, learn and play supports walking as a form of everyday transportation.

28.9% of adults in Haldimand Norfolk are obese (2011-12)



Accessibility...

- Norfolk County's population is aging
- Higher than provincial average proportion of older aged residents, with 19% of the County's current population over age 65, and 35% over 55
- Port Dover, Simcoe and Delhi have the highest proportion of older residents.




Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC)

- 13 members of the public
- Required by municipalities with a population of 10,000 or more
- Committee of Council
 - Advise council on requirements/implementation of accessibility legislation, accessibility reports, other matters which council may seek advice
 - Review site plans and drawings (S.41 Planning Act)
 - Performing all other functions specified in Regulation
